Title of Training: The DSM-IV-TR: Understanding Psychopathology & Utilizing DSM-IV Criteria in Recovery Planning and Treatment Goals

Training Category:

Counseling Theories/ Techniques and Assessment & Treatment Planning (CAC)

Intervention (SCCD, CCDP)

Training Description: This course will review how to determine a Five Axis diagnosis for co-occurring disorders according to the DSM-IV-TR. A detailed presentation of Axis I and Axis II disorders will be presented, as well as, how to identify and implement co-occurring specific treatment goals in recovery planning.

Training Objectives: Participants will 1) become familiar with the structure of the DSM-IV-TR and the Five Axis diagnostic process, 2) gain an understanding of both Axis I and Axis II disorders and how to make a differential diagnosis, 3) be able to identify differences between post-acute withdrawal and early recovery concerns and psychiatric symptoms, 4) become familiar with the symptoms and syndromes most commonly misdiagnosed in co-occurring populations, and 5) understand how to approach treatment and recovery considerations of Axis I and Axis II disorders when co-occurring with substance abuse and dependence.

Title of Training: Understanding the Relationship between Mental Illness, Chemical Dependency, and Criminality

Training Category: Forensic and Legal Issues (SCCD, CCDP)
Counseling Theories/ Techniques (CAC)
Assessment and Treatment Planning (CAC)

Training Description: This training is designed to provide participants with an overview of the relationship between mental illness, chemical dependency, violence and criminal behavior. This course will help participants differentiate antisocial behavior that may accompany the addictive process from antisocial personality disorder. Special attention will be paid to matching clinical/rehabilitative interventions to the unique needs and recovery goals of individual clients.

Training Objectives: Participants will be able to: a) differentiate criminal and antisocial behavior from the DSM-IV-TR diagnostic criteria for Antisocial Personality Disorder; b) understand the full range of criminal thinking and behavior; c) apply assessment strategies including violence risk assessment; d) understand how the relationship between violence, mental illness, addiction and criminality relates to the intervention chosen for each client; and e) relate intervention strategies to overall treatment and recovery planning.

Title of Training: Ethical and Legal Issues Related to the Treatment of Individuals with Co-occurring Substance Abuse and Mental Health Problems

Training Category: Ethics/ Client Rights (SCCD, CCDP)
Ethics (CAC)

Training Description: This training is designed for both administrative and clinical staff members interested in ethical problem solving and legal risk management strategies. During this training, participants will learn techniques for analyzing and resolving ethical dilemmas. Special emphasis will be placed on the application of ethics to the Treatment of Individuals with Co-occurring substance abuse and mental health Problems. Given the reality that clients with co-occurring disorders frequently receive services in a highly regulated environment from either a multi-disciplinary team of professionals or from multiple organizations, this course will also compare and contrast various clinical and business codes of ethics.

Training Objectives: At the end of this training, participants will be able to: a) Detail how legal and ethical issues are addressed by relevant professional organizations; b) Articulate similarities and differences between the various codes of clinical and business ethics presented in the class; c) Explain how to reconcile differences between codes of ethics when treating individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse problems; Describe the concept of power differential as it relates to client- therapist, client- agency, vendor- purchaser; and supervisor- supervisee relationships; d) Delineate the appropriate role of clinical and administrative personnel when interacting with clients, vendors, pharmaceutical marketing representatives, and funding/regulatory bodies; and e) Articulate the relationship between legally defensible actions, ethical practice, and personal morality.

Title of Training: Psychopharmacology: A Clinician's Guide to Understanding Psychotherapeutic Medications

Training Description: This training is intended to provide non-medical Counselors, Clinicians and Case Managers with a basic understanding of psychopharmacology so that they can provide more effective treatment to persons with co-occurring psychiatric conditions and substance abuse problems.

Training Objectives: At the end of this training, participants will be able to: a) understand the intended uses, benefits and side effects of the major classes of psychotropic medications used to treat mental health problems as outlined in TIP 42 and the ATTC medication brochure; b) describe the basic principles of neurochemistry and brain structure as it relates to use/ abuse of the various classes of psychoactive substances; c) understand the relationship between symptoms of mental illness, psychoactive drug use and response to prescribed psychotropic medication; d) employ assessment strategies to identify and target mental health symptoms that warrant a referral and/or consult with a psychiatric prescribing practitioner.

Title of Training: Effectively Communicating with Persons who may be Experiencing Active Symptoms of a Co-Occurring Mental Illness and Substance Abuse Problem

Training Category: Intervention (SCCD, CCDP)
Counseling Theories/ Techniques (CAC)

Training Description: This course is designed for any administrative or clinical staff member interested in learning more about how to effectively communicate with persons who may be experiencing active symptoms of a psychiatric illness and/ or a substance abuse problem. This workshop is designed to provide participants with proven verbal, non-verbal and environmental control strategies for communicating with a person who is experiencing active symptoms. Special emphasis will be placed on understanding the impact that different psychiatric symptoms have on how a person processes information and responds to stimulus.

Training Objectives: At the end of this training, participants will be able to: a) modify their own verbal and non-verbal communication in order to more effectively communicate with a patient who may be experiencing active symptoms of a psychiatric illness and/ or a substance abuse problem; b) implement environmental controls that help to reduce a patient's level of anxiety, agitation or paranoia; and c) adjust their own response to a patient based on the type of symptoms a patient is experiencing.

Training Description: This training is intended for clinical supervisors, senior counselors and emerging leaders who work in co-occurring treatment settings. This course is designed to blend emerging principles of effective technology transfer and customer service to achieve organizational workforce development goals while simultaneously improving the quality of care provided to persons with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse problems.

Training Objectives: At the end of this training, participants will be able to: a) establish and facilitate organizational change teams that employ continuous quality improvement strategies to improve treatment outcomes, organizational efficiency, and staff retention objectives; b) identify organizational processes and other barriers that adversely impact client engagement and retention goals; c) infuse into clinical supervision low-cost and public domain resources such as SAMHSA publications, participation in learning collaboratives like the Network for the Improvement of Addiction Treatment (NIATx), and peer led supervision groups; and d) identify and implement strategies for transforming processes for patient screening, assessment, treatment and aftercare in order to develop a truly integrated and co-occurring enhanced system of care.

The HIV curriculum material reviewed in this course is presented within the context of the Health Belief model, which can easily be translated into effective patient education and the promotion of positive changes in health practices—including a reduced risk of acquiring or transmitting the virus that causes AIDS.
